REDUCING PAPERWORK IN GENERAL PRACTICE

You may be aware of the UK Cabinet Office report '*Reducing General Practitioners*' *Paperwork*' (2001) and subsequent report '*Making a Difference: Reducing Burdens on General Practice*' (2002). These reports promoted a range of recommendations to help GPs provide more efficient care, which included reducing the amount of time spent on administrative duties.

This letter serves to re-emphasise that the Scottish Government continues to support the idea that to achieve faster and better GP services, GPs should spend less time on unnecessary administration, including the administrative needs of other organisations, thus freeing up time to focus on patient care.

In order to be clear, it should be noted that GPs are required under the General Medical Services contract to provide certain administrative duties necessary for welfare and other state purposes. Under normal circumstances, GPs must issue free of charge to a patient or their personal representative, any medical certificate described in Annex A.

However, GPs may decide to provide administrative duties outside of these obligations, such as in the case of local authority schemes, but they are not required to do so. Further, they are within their rights to charge a fee for such services should they agree to undertake them.

It is hoped this letter helps to clarify the Scottish Government's position and the arrangements that exist within the General Medical Services contract.
