

NES General Practice COVID-19 Spotlight

This is the second of a series of bulletins designed to sign post those working in primary care to relevant guidance and educational resources intended to help through the COVID-19 pandemic. It has been collated by a team at NES, with the assistance of primary care colleagues in Public Health Scotland.

Flu Immunisation Programme

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Sharing Good Practice - Risk Assessment - Influenza vaccination

The way the influenza vaccination program is being delivered is different across Scotland. One practice shared with us how they performed a risk assessment for using a community hall as part of their vaccination programme.

Doing a risk assessment was like doing a Significant Event Analysis in reverse. Instead of considering what did happen you consider what might happen, the potential impact and how to prevent harm. In SEA we are used to thinking about the people involved, the tasks they are doing and the environment in which they are working. We used a similar approach to plan how we would use an external hall as part of our flu vaccination programme.

A practice manager, GP, practice nurse and member of admin staff viewed the hall to ensure that the perspectives of different staff groups were included. We thought about the different groups of people (staff, patients, carers) and their needs.

Next we thought about the tasks and equipment needed:

- Patients understanding where to go, what to wear, what to expect, arriving and checking in, getting the vaccine, leaving.
- Clinical staff preparing work station, availability of vaccine, maintaining cold chain, knowing which vaccine to give, giving the vaccine, coding, dealing with problems
- Administrative staff checking patient identity, vaccine type, patient flow

As we did this we considered the physical environment to identify potential problems – e.g. access points, flow routes, signs we could add to make it easier, cleaning.

At each point we considered what could go wrong and asked: What are the hazards? Why would that cause a problem? What is the impact of the problem? How we could prevent problems? The <u>risk</u> <u>log</u> is attached.
