GP referral Pathway



Management of Adults (≥18 yrs) Skin and Soft Tissue Infection via QEUH Outpatient Parenteral Antibiotic Therapy (OPAT) Service

Skin or soft tissue infection affecting upper/lower limb or face (erysipelas)

GP to Review and assess severity

ORAL ANTIBIOTICS

- No signs of systemic toxicity
- No uncontrolled comorbidities
- Not yet tried oral antibiotics
- Flucloxacillin 500mg QDS
- Doxycycline 100mg BD*
- Duration 5 days (continue for further 5 days if slow response)
- *Interactions: Ca, Fe, Mg, Cations

POSSIBLE OPAT

- Systemically ill or well but with co-morbidity such as peripheral vascular disease, chronic venous insufficiency or morbid obesity which may complicate or delay resolution of their infection.
- Well but cellulitis worsening despite appropriate oral antibiotics

ADMISSION

- Significant systemic upset such as acute confusion, tachycardia, tachypnoea, hypotension
- Unstable comorbidities (e.g. AKI, cardiac decompensation or uncontrolled blood sugar)

EMERGENCY

- Septic shock
- Severe life / limb threatening infection such as necrotising fasciitis

Consider OPAT exclusion/inclusion criteria



Inclusion Criteria

- Must be able as a minimum be able to attend AND return home from first OPAT review visit
- Self-caring (or have carer to look after them)
- Willing to attend for OP IV treatment



OPAT Exclusion Criteria

- Other acute medical problems requiring inpatient management
- Alcohol dependency or current IV drug/substance use
- Significant mental health morbidity/ deliberate self harm
- Patient unwilling to attend for OP IV treatment
